Gamma Sigma's greatest honor this year was receiving the Peterson Significant Chapter Award, the highest distinction given to undergraduate Sigma Chi chapters. This recognition reflects excellence across all areas of operations, programming, and chapter development and highlights the dedication and effort of our members.

Academic Achievement

Our chapter reached a historic academic milestone by earning its highest chapter GPA ever at 3.41. This accomplishment reflects the scholarly culture we have worked hard to cultivate and the ongoing commitment our brothers demonstrate toward academic success.

Campus Involvement

Brothers continued to make a strong impact across Auburn University through meaningful leadership roles in student organizations. **Anders Wren '27** was selected as an Assistant Director of Freshman Forum, while **Hayes McKell '29**, **Jack Cobb '29**, and **Adesh Mishra '29** were chosen as members of the program.

STRENGTHEN ACADEMICS

Improving our chapter's performance in the classroom remains a key priority. Our chapter GPA increased from 3.16 to 3.41 in just six semesters. In 2026, we aim to continue that trajectory and reach a 3.5 or higher. While ambitious, it is attainable and reflects our commitment to scholarship and personal development.

EXPAND PHILANTHROPY EFFORTS

Gamma Sigma has historically excelled most notably through Derby Days, where we have raised more than \$200,000 for cancer research over the last four years. Building on that success, the chapter will introduce additional service initiatives throughout the year, including blood drives in partnership with the American Red Cross, aligning with Sigma Chi's new national philanthropic focus.
