Phase II of the Capital Campaign Is Continuing Make an Impact Today

As a result of many dedicated alumni, and 39 outstanding colony members that you will read about in this newsletter, we are headed toward an April reinstallation of the Gamma Sigma Chapter of Sigma Chi and rehabilitation of our house at 737 W. Magnolia this fall. Alumni have been working to raise the funds necessary to renovate the house and provide funding needed to support the scholarship and leadership needs of the chapter. We are currently in Phase II of this campaign. In Phase I we raised \$176,000. In Phase II we have raised \$75,000, for a total of \$246,900. While we are grateful for all contributions we have received, we are far short of reaching our \$500,000 goal.

We need everyone's help to provide our new brothers with a first-class house and to support their scholastic and leadership programs. As you will see in this newsletter, our colony members have made great strides in a short period of time to become a leadership example to the Auburn Greek system.

The house needs renovations to the interior and exterior prior to the brothers coming back in the fall. Specific details of the campaign, including the renovations that have to be made to the house, can be found at our website, www.auburnsigmachi.com, on the capital campaign tab.

I sincerely believe that most our lives have been significantly enriched by our Sigma Chi experience, while at Auburn and beyond. In 2008, Michael and brother **Jason Malone '96** reconnected over their love of home brewing, and in July of that year decided to open Good People Brewing Co.—Birmingham's first brewery. "It was a good hobby gone wrong," Michael laughs.

We accepted 18 new members during fall recruitment and expect to bring in several more this spring. Our intramural teams also excelled, with our soccer team playing hard and our football team winning the small fraternity championship—the first for the fraternity in a long time. In addition, we renovated the playground at Saint Michael's Catholic Church as a community service project, which ended up being an excellent brotherhood building event.

Academic Focus

Our GPA for the semester was 3.08, and we have implemented an eight hours per week study policy for all members with a GPA of 2.75 or lower. Most significantly, we were awarded the Small Fraternity of the Year award from Auburn's Interfraternity Council, a prestigious honor and a sign of more good things to come.

Preparing for Spring Recruitment

This coming semester will be a busy one for the

colony. We recently returned from a weekend trip to the beach in Destin, Florida, from January 18-21. The trip was a great opportunity for strengthening our brotherhood. The colony participated in Mission 365 training on January 26 in preparation for recruitment the following week. We held spring recruitment from January 29-31, and we hope to add several more quality men to our colony.

James W. Fitzpatrick Jr. '42 was active duty in the military from 1942-64 and in the Army reserve from 1946-55. He spent his working career with major industrial engineering companies until his retirement in 2003. He and Ruth were married since 1948 until her death in 2009. James and Ruth had one son, James.

Tom O. Fuller '52 is retired and living in England. Tom recalls that he and three Auburn ROTC graduates were sent to the 52nd field artillery battalion in Japan in 1953. After a few months of intensive training, they were sent to Korea and it took them almost a week to arrive. "We were alerted to go to the front line. President Eisenhower and North Korean leaders realized that three Auburn guys would muddle up their war, so they agreed on a cease fire effective July 27, 1953." After a few weeks, the men were sent to perform guard duty at a POW camp near Pusan. Tom was an officer every third day and third night. Eventually, Tom returned to Alabama and became off-duty but stayed in the reserves.

Alan C. Stone '61 was in the U.S. Marine Corps from 1961-'68; an airline pilot from 1968-1997; an NTSB accident investigator from 1997-2003; and an aircraft accident investigator from 2003 until his retirement in 2016. He lives in Miami, Fla. E-mail: apstone@comcast.net
